H2O Project in Action

Abstain from my favorite drink for 2 weeks and give that money to those who don't have anything safe to drink. That is our Lenten H2O project and has intrigued me since I first heard of it. I have participated in giving ever since my first meeting in 2000, and I never really expected to see the project in action.

In 2016 I went with a Secular Franciscan, Stephen H. Smith, OFS, who had organized a mission trip to Uganda. His organization is called "To The Nations" and it operates from Atlanta. He is a retired school Principal who is very involved with "Life Teen", an international Catholic youth movement. Stephen was at our 2016 Quinquennial and invited us along. I joined his December mission trip. I am going again in July 2018. Are you called to join me?

Imagine my surprise when we went to a remote village in the middle of the African bush, and I saw with my own eyes the fruit of 16 years of giving to the NAFRA H2O project! Our 2016 Lenten H2O project was given To The Nations to establish a water line for a village that was without a clean source of water. They had to walk guite a distance to even get to a questionable water source, shared with a motorcycle and car wash. The cement that houses the faucet - yes, one faucet for the whole village-has painted on it "PACE E BENE OFS T - TO THE NATIONS".

We were greeted by the villagers, given pineapples, and Stephen cut the ribbon. Scores of yellow jugs waited to be filled to supply water for each household. There was a big celebration and ceremony complete with speeches. The village elder said they have been waiting for water for centuries. Centuries!! And God has given them water now, thanks to our Lenten H2O project.

On our NAFRA website our national budget indicates that *To The Nations* is again receiving money to build more sources for clean water. I expect to see another water source dedicated on my next trip, and I will be touched to see our H2O project answering centuries of prayers of another village.

Peace and good! Oh the places you'll go....! Amazing how our regional online website sparked a conversation across "the pond" with a Aldora, a Secular Franciscan in the UK about starting up a youth group for teens! I directed to the Program for use with High School and Young Adults and also to the proper CIOFS documents to assist her. May God bless her efforts !

And then off to Eavpt! In December was the release of a PBS docudrama The Sultan and The Saint. It is the story of Francis' encounter with Sultan Malik al-Kamil of Egypt in the 13th century amid the Fifth Crusade and it has become an important symbol of interfaith dialogue and the pursuit of peace, even in the midst of great conflict. It is a blend of scholarly, documentary-style interviews with dramatic reenactments of the story. Academy Award-winning actor Jeremy Irons is narrator. This idea that a simple Christian friar met with a mighty Muslim leader and together they had a relatively brief encounter may have had enormous consequences.

Most Franciscans know the story from "our" side. It was so insightful to hear the additional input provided by learned scholars from many disciplines as to the rest of the story! And , as the film ended, I felt challenged as to "what is my part to do"-- to be a *bridge* in our society, to be a *peacemaker*, and *harbinger of hope and good will*? We need to ask ourselves- How do we respond when we encounter Muslims in our community? Watching the DVD may give you some additional and surprising information that may "ignite" the Franciscan fire within you to act in some way for peace! I hope that if you missed the show that you check it out of your public library! It's in the system.

Knowing that the DVD is not just meant for professed Franciscans, but that it can be a wonderful tool to spark vocations. interreligious dialogue and meaningful conversations with our young adults, my husband and I donated a copy of the DVD to the Newman club at Stony Brook university. The Newman club executive board will review the DVD and we are hoping that they will schedule an on-campus viewing party together with the Muslim Community. If this sounds like something you might like to bring to the attention of your local parish Director of **Religious Education or Youth** Minister, or Director of Adult Education, give me a phone call and I can assist you in facilitating the dialogue.

For the spring break, members of the Newman club went on a mission trip to Appalachia this year. I believe that their chaplain may have reached out to several fraternities who assisted them last year. Thank you to those fraternities who responded with financial assistance.

Unfortunately, there is no end in sight. Our lives have become a pressure cooker and we are in it. 


